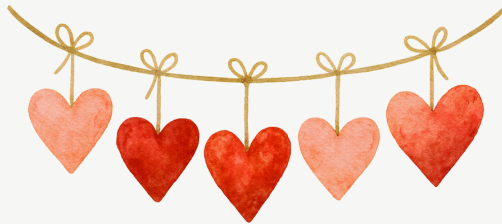

Attendance Levels Need Improvement

Our attendance levels are slipping to a seriously low level, which means classroom performance is down, which means learning levels are down, and that could spell trouble for some of our students, not only during their primary school careers, but also into adulthood because they may be learning erroneous lessons such as school is incidental and not important, going to school late is better than not going at all, and that it is okay to miss school altogether with no consequences. I, as your school principal, am here to say that none of those ideas are true.

Education is very important and it is not okay to show up casually late to school without a valid reason. Missing too much school is detrimental, primarily because of the loss of learning opportunities that your children can't get back. Children who miss too much school can fall behind their peers and develop a sense of feeling overwhelmed because they are lost in class and feel that they will never catch up. All of this can be avoided by attending school regularly.

If you have a child who is missing school regularly or not getting to school on time, I suggest starting with a warning from a parent and then moving to a logical consequence if the behavior isn't corrected. School-based consequences can go from a simple warning, all the way to students repeating failed classes, or even repeating entire quarters or more. There is a lot at stake. We need to work together to make sure our students are in school as much as possible before the consequences phase needs to be deployed. Let's work together for the benefit of our students, your children, and get them to school routinely and on time each day. Everyone will benefit if we can do that together.



Sometime over the course of the next week or so, I plan to send individual emails to parents of students who have developed lower than expected levels of attendance. If your child is missing a lot of school, you should expect an email from me soon. Parents will have choices, including having a meeting with me to develop a plan. To be reminded, the school's policy allows for students to miss up to 4 days per quarter, which comes out to 16 absences per year to remain in compliance with the 90% expectation we have in place at New Heights. Of course, there may be reasons for students to miss more than 4 days per quarter, but the school will require parents to provide valid reasons/excuses for the absences. Failure to work with the school on this matter could result in students failing classes and possibly even delaying graduation. The attendance policy of New Heights is not strict, it is typical. Let's remember that children under the age of 18 are required by law to be in school. Choosing New Heights as your educational community means that our families agree to abide by the school's expectations, including those related to attendance. It appears that many of our families will benefit from this gentle reminder that attendance rates matter, and it's time to get back on track. Watch for an email from me in the next week or so, and please be prepared to work with me to get this matter corrected. Remember, there is a lot at stake.

The MCA is a statewide assessment that is given to Minnesota students in several content areas each spring.

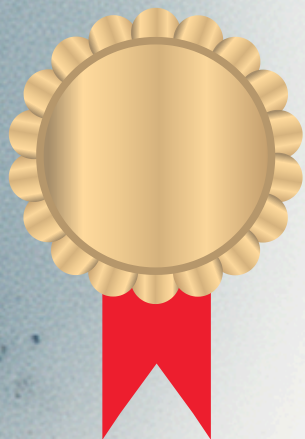
The Reading MCA is for grades: 3rd-8th and 10th.

The Math MCA is for grades: 3rd-8th and 11th.

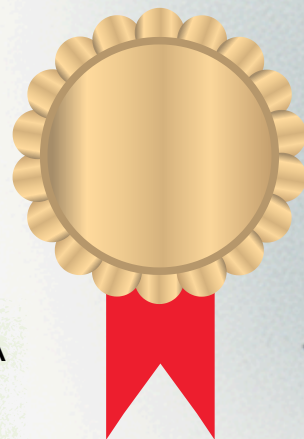
The Science MCA is for: 5th and 8th grade, as well as all students enrolled in Biology.


