Welcome Back

Welcome to the New School Year everyone! The new school year has begun and at the time I am writing this letter, we are nearing the end of the 8th day of school already! Our students have handled the transition from summer to school life very well so far. They also aren't complaining much about the new start time, which is a lot earlier than our former start time. Most students are arriving to school on time, which is great. I'm not sure how much the time of day is impacting behavior, but so far our school days have been very orderly and quiet. So, from a variety of vantage points, we seem to be off to a great start to the new school year.

Each year has its own feel, largely due to two factors: new students and new staff. This year, we have a nice group of new students who seem to be fitting in and finding their "spot" here at school. We also have 4 new staff members who are getting acclimated to the environment at New Heights. As a quick introduction, here are the names and roles of our 4 new staff members: Robyn Radke is our new K and 1 teacher; Brenna Barwald is our new 2-3 teacher; Harmony Gonzalez is our new elementary special education teacher; and Tyler Auge is our new 6-12 social studies and language arts teacher. Each of them has a story to tell and you will learn more about them in either this newsletter or in a future edition in the coming months. They have each been making solid contributions so far and we believe they will all do great things during their time here at New Heights.

School Security

I'm sure you are all aware of the tragic event that occurred at Annunciation Catholic School and Church in Minneapolis on August 27th. That event, as many prior school tragedies have, prompted parents to wonder if New Heights has a safety plan in place. The answer is "of course we do," but so did Annunciation. Schools are required to have safety and crisis plans in place. Many of the aspects of a good school safety plan includes the involvement of local professionals such as members of the police department and fire department. Our current plan is in the review and edit stages, but that process was already occurring well before the event at Annunciation.

Our school has an excellent safety record, but that is not a reason to relax and simply assume we will continue to have a safe school without future consideration. Having a safe school requires a commitment to safety, which includes the school's staff, parents and students, as well as local community members. Even still, there are things that can happen. It is my belief that there is something about our school, its size, and our reputation that helps you feel the school is a safe place for your child(ren). For some, our safety record may be the main reason for enrolling. I/we make the safety of our students and staff the primary priority. We will continue to be vigilant in ensuring that our students, your children, have a happy and safe school experience as long as they are here!

Cooperation Needed

As you are likely aware, there are several things that public schools are obligated to do to remain in compliance with the government's expectations and requirements. Some of those things require the cooperation of our parents. For example, there are certain things we have to collect, such as medical records, shot records, financial information in certain cases, and other types of information that, to be honest, is awkward to ask for. In some cases the school doesn't want to be the organization that has to ask, but we are required to do so. So, if the school requests certain types of permissions or information from one or both parents about your child(ren), please know that we are simply trying to obtain things that the state or federal government requires of the school and, in certain cases, may even threaten to withhold funding for lack of compliance. As the world gets more and more complicated, the school can be put into an awkward situation. Please try to cooperate in a timely manner with these requests to assist the school in remaining compliant. It will be greatly appreciated.

New Start and Dismissal Times

So far the transition to the earlier bell times has not caused much trouble for our families...or so it seems. Our doors will open each morning around 7:35, at which time students can enter the school and either go to a classroom or the cafeteria. Breakfast is available starting at 7:35 and we expect that all students will be in the building and in homeroom or their main classroom by 7:55. So far it has been very impressive to see that most of our families are already in sync with our new schedule. Please keep it up!

School dismisses each day at 2:25. New Heights does not offer a before or after school program, so please make arrangements to have your child picked up by 2:45 each day. Many of our staff members have commitments outside of school, so there is little support available beyond dismissal time. If you pick your child up after school each day and you know you are going to be late, please notify the main office by calling the school's main number: 651-439-1962 and be prepared to give an ETA so we know when to expect you.
