Getting Started

As I continue to get older, I am sometimes amazed at how fast time passes by. The first month of school is in the books. Leaves are changing and Halloween is just around the corner. The school year has taken shape and our new "normal" has presented itself. There are lots of things to be grateful for so far, including the many great additions to our student population. You might be surprised to learn that slightly more than a third of our population is brand new to the school, which also means we have new enthusiasm, new energy, and new "unknowns," at least for a while. I am pleased to say that the beginning of the year has gone smoothly up to this point. Students are attending regularly and they seem to be getting to their scheduled classes on time with no trouble. Teachers are not reporting any abundance of disrespect or work refusals, so, knock on wood, the start of the year seems to be one to celebrate.

Attendance Matters

Our students are doing their part so far when it comes to daily school attendance. New Heights requires its students to attend school at a rate of 90% or higher each school year. We know that, statistically speaking, students who are habitually absent from school learn less and earn poor grades when compared to students who attend school at a rate of 90% or better. We monitor the attendance rates of all of our students closely, and students who miss school at an excessive rate are at risk of missing critical information presented in class because they are not present in class, which then leads to poor grades as a result of learning less due to the absences.

Another thing to consider when it comes to attendance is that when children are in school they are programming their brains based on certain behaviors that lead to positive rewards or negative consequences. Students who miss a lot of school are at risk of becoming adults who miss a lot of work. We know that missing too much school results in less learning, less skill building and poor grades, and all of that can lead to poor self esteem. If our kids carry these patterns into adulthood, they will believe it is okay to miss work excessively because they never corrected this pattern. Missing too much work will get you fired, which leads to lots of problems, including homelessness and other physical and mental health related issues. Therefore, it is critically important to work with our young people to develop solid attendance-related habits that will likely follow them into their adult lives. Our students will eventually become

members of the workforce and they will be more productive, earn better salaries and will likely have more satisfying lives, in part, because they learned that attendance matters in their early years.

Please do all you can to ensure that your children are making it to school on time each and every day possible.

Fall and Colder Weather

True, we did have one of the hottest summers recorded over the past 150 years in our area, but if there is one thing we can predict living in this region, the colder weather will return... sooner rather than later. As fall rolls on, it is recommended that children dress in layers so that they can be comfortable at school under any situation until the heating season requires that we fire-up the school's boiler system.

Dressing in layers simply means having hoodies, sweatshirts, sweaters, pullovers, etc. available to put on or take off as the temps fluctuate throughout the fall. There will be warmer days and cooler days, but we don't over-react by turning the heating system on and off until the building temps would routinely drop to 60 degrees or colder. Heating a large building like a school isn't like heating a home, and the economy has made it expensive to heat the building, so we are simply letting everyone know that dressing sensibly in layers until the temps are routinely cooler is going to allow your children to be more comfortable throughout the early stages of fall. It is most typical that we fire-up the heating system somewhere around November 1st, but the actual outdoor and indoor temps will dictate when we start to heat the school.

It is also advisable for families to be prepared for our students in grades K-5 to have their outdoor gear at school by November 1st so that they can comfortably go outside for recess on any given day. Outdoor gear for K-5 students includes winter boots, hats, gloves/mittens, coat/jacket, snow pants, and anything else you may think of. It is always recommended that parents put their children's names somewhere on each item of clothing to prevent lost items, but that is up to each parent to facilitate.

School Breakfast Times

All New Heights students are invited and welcome to enjoy a free meal any or every morning they attend school...under the condition that they are able to do so during the times that we are open for breakfast. It is always tricky at the start of the school year, but now that we are into October, we are going to have to be firm about the times we open and close the cafeteria for breakfast for two main reasons:

- 1. Our staff are not dedicated to meal service alone and have other areas of responsibility to attend to; and
- 2. ALL of our students are required to be either in class or homeroom at 9:05. So, students who desire breakfast will have to be able to obtain it and finish it between 8:45 and 9:05.

Breakfast at school is an opportunity, not a requirement. Students arriving late to school will not be able to participate in the breakfast offering.
